## Domestic Violence in Hawai'i

#### DATA AND STATISTICS SNAPSHOT

- **Domestic violence (DV)** is the willful intimidation, physical assault, battery, sexual assault, and/or other abusive behavior as part of a systematic pattern of power and control perpetrated by one intimate partner against another.
- **Intimate partner violence (IPV)** is abuse or aggression that occurs in a romantic relationship referring to both current and former spouses and dating partners.
- **Stalking** is a pattern of behavior directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to fear for the person's safety or the safety of others; or suffer substantial emotional distress.
- **Dating violence** is violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim.





# LGBTQ+ Community in Hawai'i



Research has shown that LGBTQ+ individuals have a higher lifetime prevalence of IPV than the general national population.

Additionally, transgender and gender non-conforming individuals are at a particularly increased risk of IPV.


Because of the discrimination and marginalization that LGBTQ+ individuals historically and currently experience, these communities face additional barriers to seeking help and support from service providers.


# **Emergency Shelter**<sup>5</sup>

Emergency shelters in Hawai'i offer survivors of domestic violence up to 120 day a safe haven. Shelters offer counseling support, services for adults and children, safety planning and more, all while ensuring each person's basic needs are met.

This data was obtained from October 2020 to September 2021. It includes information from 8 domestic violence shelters throughout the state.


